Chromebooks 1.1

With our new school year comes a major change to our students and faculty—the introduction of Chromebooks 1:1. Darren Biggs, Patrick County Public Schools System Director of Technology has been working on the plan for quite some time. Technology is essential for student learning in today's information and technology reliant society. When asked, "Why Chromebooks?" Biggs answered, "Chromebooks are quick and easy to use. Everything is cloud-based so you don't have to worry about losing data. Most importantly for our District, they are cost effective. The Chromebook is the student's own personal device, meaning they have more permissions than in a one-to-many environment." Teachers are learning the features and advantages of the Chromebooks along with the students. Spanish Teacher Anita Knight has been very pleased with how excited her students have been about doing assignments on the Chromebooks. Instead of complaining, she says, they are saying, "Mrs. Knight, this is fun!" So far, Biggs is pleased with the initiative. "Everything seems to be going great."

PCHS Students View the Eclipse

On August 21 students and staff were released from class to view the solar eclipse through special glasses provided by the school system. Before students were escorted to their viewing area, they were instructed on how to properly use the glasses and were allowed to stand, sit, or even lay on the grass to observe the eclipse with no obstructions.

Two teachers were especially excited about this opportunity to share such a memorable event with their students—Earth Science teachers Rendy Williams and Crystal Fain. According to Mrs. Fain, it is often difficult for students to visualize concepts in Earth Science because they take place on such a massive scale. "It is hard to grasp that the top of Mount Everest used to be ocean floor! It can be even harder to understand concepts related to astronomy since most of them are taking place outside our perspective." She went on to say that being able to view the solar eclipse in real time brought the concepts alive and made them relatable. "After being given a brief overview of what was happening, students were able to see the concepts all come together in that 'ah ha' moment."

Mrs. Williams agreed that it was a really good experience. Being able to teach about the event as it was happening was a rare opportunity. "This is something we will all remember!" said Williams.







SOVA Youth Expo 2017

Our 8th and 9th graders will attend the Career ChoICE (Imagine Connect Explore) on September 27 & 28 at the Olde Dominion Agricultural Center in Chatham, VA.

The Dan River Region Collaborative and the Southern Virginia Career ChoICE Youth Expo Planning Team invite employers from across the region to participate in the SOVA Career ChoICE Youth Expo to expose seventh, eighth, and ninth grade students from Danville and Martinsville and the counties of Halifax, Henry, Patrick, and Pittsylvania to real-life career choices in their respective and surrounding communities. Chromebook Handbook

Student Responsibilities:

The Chromebook is an important learning tool and is to be used for educational purposes only. In order to take the Chromebook home each day, you must be willing to accept the following responsibilities.

- When using the Chromebook at home, at school, and anywhere else I may take it, I will follow the policies of Patrick County Public Schools, particularly the Chromebook Student Handbook and the Acceptable Use Policy, and abide by all local, state, and federal laws.
- I will treat the Chromebook with care by not dropping it, getting it wet, leaving it in an automobile, leaving it outdoors, unsecured, or in a place where it may become damaged or stolen.
- I will not lend the Chromebook to anyone, not even my friends or family members.
- I will not remove division-owned programs or files from the Chromebook.
- I will charge my Chromebook nightly so that it has a full charge at the start of school every day.
- I understand that if leave my Chromebook at home or do not charge it, I am still responsible for getting course work done as if I had my Chromebook present and charged.
- I will bring the Chromebook to school every day. If I leave my Chromebook at home for multiple consecutive days, I may be called upon to bring the device in to verify possession and condition of the Chromebook.
- I agree that email (or any electronic communication) should be used only for appropriate, legitimate, and responsible communication.
- I will keep all accounts and passwords assigned to me secure and will not share them with anyone.
- I will not attempt to repair the Chromebook. If it is not working properly, I will notify IT support staff, teachers, or administrators. A Chromebook needing repair should be brought to the library.
- I will bring the Chromebook to IT support staff if it needs repair. If it does need repair, the student's record will be checked, a loaner may be checked out if the student is eligible and a device is available. If it is determined that needed repair is due to intentional damage or neglect, the student will subsequently be informed.

College Guidance

Welcome back! We're already starting to think about the college-going process for our juniors and seniors, so mark your calendars for these upcoming events.

All juniors and seniors will attend the PCHS College Fair on Tuesday, September 12 during the school day. This will give students a chance to meet with representatives from 50 colleges and universities to get information about their programs and ask questions.

For seniors planning to attend 4-year colleges, the ACT will be held at PCHS on Saturday, October 28. The deadline to register for the test is Friday, September 22. Registration is online at act.org, and if your student qualifies for free or reduced lunch, they may see Ms. Rosenthal for a fee waiver.

Also for seniors, the SAT will be held on Saturday, October 7 (NOT at PCHS - it is offered at Basset HS and Martins-ville HS), and the registration deadline is Friday, September 8. The test will also be offered at PCHS on Saturday, November 4, and the registration deadline is Thursday, October 5. Registration is online at sat.org, and if your student qualifies for free or reduced lunch, they may see Ms. Rosenthal for a fee waiver.
